The Centre for Alternative and Virtual Education, affectionately known as the CAVE, provides an alternative method for students to receive their education. We pride ourselves on being flexible for students and families who are busy with work, extracurricular activities, life, or just need a different environment to learn. The courses we offer are online and can be worked on from virtually anywhere. We have had students work on courses while traveling in Asia and Europe to students just wishing not to attend a traditional school. The staff is kind, understanding and will always go the extra mile to help a student understand the material they are learning. Because of this virtual environment, we provide easier access to courses if schedules at students' traditional schools don't fit. We also provide a calm quiet environment in which, if students wish, can come and work on their courses. This all adds up to a comfortable learning environment for students.

Our Context

School Profile:

The Centre for Alternative and Virtual Education (The CAVE) is an alternative school that provides high school courses in an informal, friendly and flexible learning environment. The CAVE is staffed by a Principal, five teachers and one support staff. We are located in the town of Athabasca just up the street from the library. The school is in a converted home.

The school offers all core courses in Grades 10, 11 and 12, as well as some elective courses, Work Experience, Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP), Dual Credit.

The CAVE primarily serves students in high school, as well as adult learners; students 19 years of age or younger are funded through Alberta Education/Government of Canada; students older than 19 years as of September 1st are able to take courses through the CAVE at a cost per credit. Students in Grade 7-9 can be considered for placement at the CAVE upon the recommendation of the Superintendent, although this is rare.

The CAVE is different from other schools in structure, scheduling and culture as well as in clientele. Students who attend the CAVE do so because they need or desire greater flexibility within, and control over, their educational programming. The school serves a very heterogeneous group of students, from those who struggle to those who wish to accelerate their program.

The CAVE runs the Aspen View Outreach Program and Virtual Program.





Student Enrolment:

- Outreach students registered as of April 2023: 74 students grades 10-12 (this number fluctuates as a lot of students only take one or two courses)
- Virtual courses taken in 2022/23: just over 500 (not equivalent to students as some take more than 1 course)
- Home Education for Aspen View also runs through the CAVE with 13 students

Staff Profile:

- 4.8 FTE teachers
- 1.0 admin
- 1.0 support staff (Office administrator)

Opportunities:

Because of the structure of virtual learning, students have the ability to fit courses into their day that they otherwise cannot in the classroom. The ability to fast track and take heavier course loads in order to do so is positive. The flexibility that we offer allows students to continue with sports, work and life in a manner that works best for them. The ability to also still speak directly with a teacher to get assistance is a positive. For those who attend outreach, it is a calm supportive environment where distractions are removed making it a pleasant facility to work in.

Challenges:

Challenges facing the CAVE are how to improve course completion and student motivation to work on their virtual courses. Because most of the students taking courses are not in our building but located in other communities, communication with students can be difficult. There are a great many moving pieces to making a virtual student successful including admin, teachers, students, parents and virtual coordinators so the structure between them all has to be solid. Challenges for students who often attend outreach come with various levels of completion and social emotional concerns. Learning how to aid them with all these challenges while still trying to complete courses can be difficult.

Reflection on Results

Data is difficult to obtain for a great deal of the measures. As the summary above shows most categories are N/A which means there was not enough data collected to make the results valid. For example if we do not have at least 6 students write a diploma it will not be counted. Diploma courses are difficult when taken in person with a teacher; they are even more difficult when doing it self directed virtually. Because of this lack of data, we are developing methods of collecting our own within the CAVE. Our main focus is going to be course completion within the time a course should be completed. Less carry overs from semester 1 to 2 if possible. Another focus will be collecting data on our diploma mark to school awarded mark. Although sample size is small we can still collect this and over time will have a better sample size. Third focus is support that we can offer to help virtual students be more successful


